In a General Audience address delivered on May 29, 2013, Pope Francis told those listening to ask themselves, "Do I feel part of the family of the Church? Faith is a gift and an act which concern us personally, but God calls us to live with our faith together, as a family, as Church."

Our parish mission statement begins, "We, the parish family of St. Francis of Assisi, formed in 1980, are gifted with wisdom, productivity, and vitality." In this issue of The Spirit of St. Francis, we

take the time to celebrate how our parish has lived our faith together as a family by sharing its gifts to build our people and reach out to others in service of Christ. We are especially blessed by how our parish makes everyone feel welcome and understood.

As we proceed on our Lenten journey, let us ponder how we can keep being a source of God's

renewing love and mercy. The traditional pillars of Lent-prayer, fasting, and almsgiving—are good ways to focus our efforts.

In addition to attendance at one of our weekend Masses, perhaps you can try joining us for daily Mass or our 6:30 am Liturgy of the Word and Communion Service Monday-Thursday. When our journey brings us to the Sacred Triduum, we highly encourage you to join us on all three days to fully meditate on the Paschal Mystery.

One of the benefits of fasting is that it makes us pay more attention to our neighbor. We can fast from selfishness and be compassionate to others. We can fast from grudges that embitter our hearts and seek the joy of reconciliation. These

In Everyday Stewardship: Reflections for the Journey, Tracy Earl Welliver lists six




characteristics of an everyday steward. They are characteristics of individuals; they are also the fruits of living as everyday stewards. Welliver lists the following characteristics:


- 1. Be mindful







To Have Hope is to Live

Traveling to Uganda as a Global Fellow of Catholic Relief Services

Catholic Relief Services (CRS) is the official overseas development agency of the American Catholic community. The Catholic Bishops of the United States founded it in 1943 to serve World War II survivors in Europe. Now reaching people in over 100 countries on five continents, CRS has several signature program areas: emergency response and recovery, agricultural livelihoods, and health and social services.

As a Global Fellow of CRS, I share information and support the values of CRS by preaching and teaching. I was invited to be part of an oversight team which visited Uganda in January 2019. Five deacons, three priests, and three CRS staff members journeyed together to see in person the incredible results of so many programs in which CRS is involved.

Coming face to face with people who are benefitting firsthand from so many beneficial programs, I could see programs I had only heard about or seen videos about come to life, and from the stories and comments of these people, I saw how much these programs mean to them.

As I look back upon my trip to Uganda, I am vividly reminded of encountering our God of Hope.

God of Hope, we encounter you in families.

We met Beatriz, a widow of 13 years who is trying to support her family by cultivating and harvesting her 1,500 coffee plants. Through CRS, she has learned to benefit the most from her crops and avoid the costly penalties of dealing with a middleman. She and her entire family are involved.

God of Hope, we encounter you in students.

Through the efforts of CRS, a brand new school in the Bidi Bidi Refugee Settlement has been built for 2,000 students. The school boasts nine classrooms, new latrines, and housing for the teachers. The land upon which the school is located has been generously donated by the Muslim owners.

God of Hope, we encounter you in workers.

Young girls who are over 18 now have a future, thanks to the vocational training they have received from CRS and its affiliates. We visited two places, a dress shop and a hair salon, both managed by young ladies who have learned the trade. In addition, we met men who had been trained as carpenters and auto mechanics. This has given all of them hope for a good future.

God of Hope, we encounter you in community.

We were able to sit in on a community meeting, organized by CRS staff, at the Bidi Bidi Refugee Settlement during our trip.

We listened to the members' incredible stories, as well as how they have learned to work together as a community to begin to build a new life for themselves.

God of Hope, we encounter you in refugees.

Probably the most moving part of my trip was visiting the second-largest refugee settlement in the world, Bidi Bidi. Some 270,000 people live there. They are only a part of the 1.2 million who have had to flee their homeland of South Sudan. As far as the eye could see, there were dwellings, some huts, some only plastic tents. Truly, it made me feel that we must join them somehow and support them as best we can.

This trip deeply affected me. It has made me see things in a different light and has prepared me to speak of social justice with more conviction. But even more, it made me hear Jesus' words all the more, as he tells us: "Whatever you did for one of my least ones, you did for me" (Matthew 25:40).

CRS Rice Bowl



CRS provides many resources for Catholics to live in solidarity with their brothers and sisters across the world who are in need. One of the most well known and popular ways is the Lenten Rice Bowl. St. Francis has a long history of active participation and success in this Lenten observance.

Following Pope Francis' lead, the Rice Bowl invites us to take part in the second year of Share the Journey, a global campaign launched by Pope Francis to raise awareness and inspire action on behalf of migrants and refugees.

Through the Rice Bowl, we can participate in the Church's three traditional Lenten practices. We can pray by using the prayer on the side of the Rice Bowl or in the pamphlet that comes with it, we can fast by using the meatless recipes featured each week in the wonderful stories of hope from people all over the world, and we can give alms by using the Rice Bowl as a bank and coming up with creative ways to fill it by the end of Lent. Twenty-five percent of funds raised through the Rice Bowl stay in our archdiocese to support hunger and poverty alleviation, while the remaining funds support CRS programs.

Entering into Deeper Service

Parishioner Johnny Flores Discerns a Call to the Permanent Diaconate

About 20 years ago, St. Francis of Assisi parishioner Johnny Flores started thinking about the diaconate while on retreat in Louisiana.

"I sat at a table with two newly ordained deacons. I talked to these two men at length and really thought about the diaconate, but I wasn't ready," Johnny said.

The Jesuits run the retreat house that Johnny goes to in Louisiana each year, and he was really drawn to their spirituality. Since he has been married to his wife, Shirley, for almost 40 years, Johnny knew he was not going to become a Jesuit priest, but he did feel called to the clergy.

Many years after his conversation with the two deacons, Johnny again felt prompted to discern a vocation to the diaconate while he was teaching at one of the Confirmation preparation retreats. He mentioned that he had been considering the diaconate to Deacon Jim Hewson, and Deacon Jim encouraged Johnny to enter into serious discernment.

A year or so later, Johnny felt a very strong call as he was discerning while on another retreat. Knowing what he needed to do, he returned home and discussed it at length with Shirley. From there, he and Shirley met with Deacon Mike and Cathy Portele and Fr. Larry Christian, who was then the pastor of St. Francis, to get their advice. Three and a half years ago, Johnny finally started his formation.

"The Holy Spirit guided me through my discernment and led me through these meetings, the application process, and the interviews that followed," Johnny said.

Since beginning his formation, Johnny has been attending the five-year diaconate program for the Archdiocese of San Antonio at the Mexican American Catholic Colleges with monthly workshops on life in the diaconate.

Although he does not have as much time to participate as he would like because of his classes, Johnny has been involved with St. Francis' Confirmation preparation, Life Teen, and Knights of Columbus. He and Shirley have served as a sponsor couple for engaged couples, and he currently teaches a baptism preparation class each month.

"I hope that I will be able to resume active participation in these catechetical and service areas after ordination," Johnny said. "I get great joy from helping others, and I especially love teaching."

Having recently been instituted an acolyte, Johnny is now one step closer to becoming a deacon.

"The acolyte serves at the altar, assisting the deacon and the priest. An acolyte's duties can include those of an altar server and some of the duties of a deacon when there is not one present. The acolyte does not have the authority to proclaim the Gospel or perform sacraments. As an acolyte, I am an extraordinary minister of Holy Communion, and since I am also instituted as lector, I proclaim the first or second readings from time to time," Johnny said.

God willing, Johnny will complete his studies in May 2020. If Archbishop Gustavo accepts his petition, he will be ordained shortly after, most likely in May or June of that year. Please keep Johnny in your prayers as he continues his studies.

"The purpose of the diaconate is service, so it's a true blessing for me to be part of this formation process."


